My Yellow Cab Story by Alan Bebee

(A slightly summarised version of an interesting article sent in by Ian McConville, received from a friend)



This is a story about Yellow Cabs. I do this not because of my taxi driving days, but rather because I once nearly bought one. Not a real Yellow Cab, but a neat van conversion of a vintage one. The story of the background to it all is rather fascinating.

Away back in the horse drawn cabs era, some were painted yellow. The story centres around an enterprising character named John Daniel Hertz. Hertz had an entrepreneurial nature involving himself successfully in several ventures at different times. Best known was being a boxing fight promoter and manager, sportswriter for newspapers and a car salesman. This last almost landed him in trouble with too many trade-ins that did not sell. His keen business eye noted an opportunity to commence a hire car company to employ these used car trade-ins. It worked. There were many willing to pay to hire a car for a day or two rather than purchase a car for themselves. The Hertz name is still widely known in the hire car business as you know.

Hertz also noted that motor vehicles adapted to taxis were beginning to replace the old horse drawn cabs. He therefore decided to enter this field as well by forming a taxi company. The dates vary in different reports. Some say the company was formed in 1907, others state 1910. Both these car ventures of Hertz were based in Chicago, Illinois. The story is he sought advice from a local university as to



what colour would be easiest to spot. On this recommendation the company was called the Yellow Cab Company. There is no verification for this story.

Hertz was not convinced that all cars were adaptable to the rigors of the taxi work, nor were the bodies on many cars of the times suited to the purpose. He therefore created another company titled the Yellow Cab Manufacturing Company in 1919 to build his own cars. For this he purchased tried and proven four-cylinder side valve engines from the Continental Motors Company of Michigan. This company

made and sold engines of various types and sizes to any car manufacturer willing to purchase. (Continental is still in business today, primarily concerned now with small aircraft engines.) Continental was an engine maker only.

The vehicle that emerged from the Yellow Cab Manufacturing Company was a pretty rugged, but purposeful and a reliable car ideally suited to the work. Hertz even had Continental cast engine heads for him with the words Yellow Cab in raised letters. Quick change disc wheels were used rather than the normal ash spoked wheels then common in America. Brakes were initially on the back wheels only. Later models did incorporate front brakes as well. A notable feature was the headlights mounted on the scuttle.

This is a picture from the internet of a restored Yellow Cab in America. Note it is a left-hand drive model. This is one of the later versions with four-wheel brakes. The passengers had the enclosed saloon at the rear. The driver sat alone up front with luggage stowage in the space alongside. The driver was thus exposed to the weather. Early versions had a black painted radiator shell. This was soon changed to the nickel plate version as on this model.

The Yellow Cab Company quickly proved a very successful business, causing Hertz to move into New York and soon other cities establishing local branches of the company, with each branch employing his own make of cars. Taxis in Melbourne today, as an example have a working life of five

years or a maximum of seven when they have to be replaced. These old Hertz Yellow Cabs had a working life of between ten and fifteen years.

The gearing on these Yellow Cabs produced a top speed of little over 40 miles per hour or say 80 KPH at a pinch. Power came through a three speed and reverse crash box (double clutch needed). The steering was positive and the large brake drums adequate for the job. Magneto ignition was normal, and a self-starter motor was fitted.

Not content with spreading his Yellow Cab companies across America Hertz soon moved into Canada and looked elsewhere overseas. England and most parts of the continent of Europe were difficult due to local laws and conditions. Australia was a target. A batch of right-hand drive Yellow Cabs were sent to Australia to found the first branch in Sydney with Melbourne and the other capitals following soon after

This picture is of a restored right hand drive model displayed in a car museum in Australia somewhere. Apart from switching the driving position there is virtually no change to the bodywork. Another point is that although the name was Yellow Cab, the actual shade of yellow varied as to what was available anywhere. It could be a light citrus shade or could vary across the range to be in fact an orange shade. The bonnets and mudguards were usually black. There were some instances of yellow bonnets.

The Yellow Cab Manufacturing Company proved to be a very profitable venture, It was sold to General Motors in 1925. General Motors continued building purpose taxis but now using GM mechanical components.

This rear view of a yellow Cab shows just how simple the body work really was. The spare wheel was instantly accessible.

So, what has all this got to do with me very nearly buying one? There was some company here in Melbourne, and I have never found out who or where they were, that made a



business of buying these Yellow Cabs as they were sold out of service. The bodies were dismantled leaving a bare chassis. On this was built a new van body with an identical driver's compartment and with two opening rear van doors. These converted Yellow Cabs found







ready buyers amongst the like of grocers, butchers and other traders and some tradesmen where their simple reliability for being a local delivery run around was all that was required.

I grew up in Canterbury and I can well remember at least three such van conversions being used regularly for local deliveries by grocers. The post WW II new car availability did not easily displace these Yellow Cab vans from their duties. There was no need to. In 1959 I learned one of these converted Yellow Cabs was coming up for sale. My informant said the price would be twenty-five pounds. I was now in the workforce and could afford that. The big stop for me was our family was about to move over to Clayton. So, I did not make the purchase.

These Yellow Cab van conversions could be seen in other suburbs from time to time. I can also remember having once seen one over Yardville way in less than pristine condition having been converted into a tow truck with a sort of wooden utility body behind the cab enclosing the crane.

As a supplement to the story, a taximeter is a mechanical device introduced in the motor car era. It works on two factors. One is that it takes its drive from the speedometer cable to convert the mileage travelled into money units. The second factor that comes into play when the meter is engaged and the car is stationary is a clock that can add waiting time to the money charged.

The first taximeters were worked by a clockwork mechanism. This was common until fairly recent times, certainly into the 1960's. The current meters are electronic but do the same functions.

I hope you enjoyed this story.
